PUBLIC WORKS SUPERINTENDENT REPORT – James Foster

Water/Sewer

• A crew was called in after hours for a sewer blockage on Park Street that affected homes. We were able to get it flowing, with further work being done the next day.

Trustee Hendrickson: Was the cause of the sewer issues tree roots?

James: Yes. That incident was.

- New Remote Telemetry Units (RTUs) have been received. Three of the six have been installed.
- The Emergency Response Plan (ERP) has been reviewed, updated, and certified with EPA per requirements.
- Public Works was called in for the recent flooding at the Elementary School. Valve at the school was in a locked closet, and we were called in to be able to shut off the service to the building in the event no key was found. They did find the key by the time we were able to get there.
- Public Works was called in for a water event at 9pm last Thursday, the coldest day of the season so far. Repairs went about as well as one could hope.

Streets

Cellular trail cameras have been installed to catch people illegally dumping at the
Village Burn Site. With the Police Departments help, we have caught people. The
security camera bid has not come back from Lloyd IT Services yet, but this is still
in the works. Cell cameras will be moved around town once this system is up and
running. Plans are to be able to use them in repeated trouble spots, such as
Wanless Park to curb off road vehicles.

Parks/Property

• Rochester Township helped us with cutting ditches along the bike trail for drainage.

Training/Consideration

- Public Works skid steer needs replacement.
 - Trustee Hendrickson: We are getting a bigger skid steer I hope? James: Yes. We would like to get something bigger than what we have now.
- Road salt spreader will hopefully make it to the end of the season. A new one is being shopped for. Estimated cost is \$8,000 too \$10,000.

Code Officer Info

• Various permits have been updated for the 2022 season.

Trustee Hendrickson: I see Altorfer is still billing us for the rental of the generator at the lift station. Have we asked for a discount?

James: Yes. They agreed to knock off a few hundred dollars per month.

Trustee Hendrickson: What is our window for delivery?

James: 26 weeks from order. We are expecting is in March or April 2022.

POLICE CHIEF REPORT – Chief Sommer

Personnel

- The School Resource Officer and Part-time Police Officer positions are still vacant, awaiting qualified applicants. Advertisements for these positions will be posted this month.
- Lindsey Novak will be starting a 10-week internship on January 10, 2022. The internship will end in March 2022.

Training

- Recruit Meadows started the 14-week Basic Law Enforcement Academy (full-time) at Macon County Law Enforcements Training Center (MCLETC) on January 9, 2022. Graduation will be held in April 2022.
- Detective Harris completed in-house Evidence Technician training with the Sangamon County Sheriff's Office. He will be able to process local crime scenes.
- Officer Schnell and Officer Todd obtained the certification of Juvenile Officer in December 2021.
- All officers will attend use of force simulator training at MCLETC throughout January.

Misc.

• The 2011 Ford Expedition was purchased in December. Equipment is currently being installed in it. It will be assigned to Detective Harris.

Trustee Hendrickson: Legislature passed corrections bill and moved new things back to July 2022. Does that affect Rochester Police?

Chief: It all depends on the size of the town/department.

Trustee Hendrickson: Are we classified as a detention facility?

Chief: No. We do not have holding cells. Only an interview room.
